

"Wow! What a weekend." September 8,9 &10, 2017. 220 patrollers and guests, 6 National Board Members, our good friend Melanie Hood, NSP Marketing and Development Director, and the newest member of the National Office Staff Meegan Moszynski our new NSP Executive Director all gathered at Boyne Mountain for the 2017 Central Division Patroller Conference. It started with a Motorcycle tour

of Northern Michigan and the start of fall colors Friday morning and then a tour of Shaggy's Copper Country Skis (Northern Michigan's Artisan Ski Maker) Friday afternoon. The weekend continued Saturday with updates on National Issues and seminars on Bike Patrolling, LAR, Adaptive Chair Evacuation and Medical Issues. Participants found lots to do. In our post event survey, some participants commented that there was too much to do and having to choose between seminars.



The National Staff and Board Members presented an update on activities at the National level and participated in a "roundtable" discussion with conference attendees later in the day. These plus the "incidental contacts" outside of formal meetings gave participants many opportunities to meet and talk with the policy makers and direction setters in our National Organization.

Jeannie Thoren, women's skiing and boot fitting expert, was one of the highlights of the weekend. Jeannie helped 15 participants (of both sexes) find fixes to boot fit issues during private appointments. Saturday evening, she had us in stitches while educating us about boot fitting and the adjustments that will improve one's enjoyment of the sport.

The main event, of course, was the presentation of Division and National Awards. Please see Martin's article elsewhere in this RPN for more information on award recipients.

Thank you to all the Northern Michigan Patrollers who planned and executed the programs that made this weekend a huge success!!!

A contingent of Northern Michigan Region patrollers attended the Bike Patrolling seminars to evaluate the potential of forming one (or more) bike patrols in our Region. Biking is one of the fastest growing activities in our area. On last count, there are six major cycling events attracting over 15,000 participants annually. In addition, Northern Michigan has nearly 1000 miles of hard surface off-road trails and nearly that again in cleared mountain bike trails



with more being added every year. These facilities attract thousands of local riders and tourists weekly. Providing patrol coverage to these events and trails seems like a natural extension of our mission. This group will be meeting in the coming weeks to finish analyzing the possibilities and establishing an action plan.

NMR barely had time to take a good deep breath when we turned to the Annual Region OEC Refresher. On Saturday, September 23rd, over two thirds of the region's patrollers gathered at Gaylord High School for a Cycle A Refresher. Approximately 80 OEC Instructors and helpers completed the "Instructor Refresher" Saturday morning. Following lunch, they provided practice, instruction and skill observation for refresher participants. Conducting both refreshers in one day is a challenge, and a very long day, for instructors but reduces the travel as most of our patrollers and instructors live several hours away. Thanks to all the instructional staff that made this a fun and meaningful event for all.

As if this wasn't enough to fill out the month, the region purchased a booth at the "Volunteer Expo" in Traverse City. This event introduces potential volunteers to volunteer activities available in the area. Our goals were modest. We wanted participants to know that volunteers provide the emergency care at Northern Michigan Resorts and to get contact information for a few potential volunteers. Actual attendance at the event was very light this year. However, we did talk with over 30 people looking for volunteer activities and provided contact information for the two Traverse City Ski Areas to 5 or 6 serious potential volunteers and even to a couple of potential volunteers for a nearby Western Michigan Region Resort.

On a sad note, we laid long time member Jeff Summers to rest today. Jeff served as a member of the Mt Holiday Ski Patrol for over 15 years. He was Ski and Toboggan Trainer and served as NMR, Section 3 Proficiency Advisor for many years. Jeff lost his five-year battle with cancer in June. Those that were lucky enough to know Jeff lost a great friend. He was only 53.

I started this on the third day of Fall in clear skies, bright sun and 90 degrees and it was hard to believe that we were only 45 days from snow making. Today as I finish, we started at 34 degrees and it is struggling to reach 55 degrees and Northern Michigan resorts are finishing summer maintenance, installing new snow guns and finalizing season startup plans. Region Trainers are busy preparing for our Senior Program Kickoff meeting and some possible pre-season OEC Module of the Senior Program Clinics. I guess it's time to find my boots and get ready to take the summer wax off my skis.



Active Alumni Program is Good for Alumni and the Patrol!

My name is Mark Holtan, this is my first article since I accepted the Division Alumni Advisor position last Fall. My home patrol is Powder Ridge Winter Recreation Area, located near St. Cloud, MN. During my 50 years of active patrolling, I have served many patrols in the Central and Northern Divisions, holding several positions from patrol director to region director. Year 51 I decided to register with the Division Alumni patrol and secondary with Powder Ridge, mainly due to physical limitations from knee surgeries.

I attended Powderfall last April, in Snowmass with the main intent of attending meetings with our National Alumni Advisor and other Division Alumni Advisors to get a better understanding of the program and how to better serve our Division Alumni Program. The meeting was postponed, yet to be rescheduled. There continues to be periodic email communications with exchange of ideas.

At our Fall Division Meeting last month, we were honored to have 5 National Board members, our National Chair, Jim Woodrum and our newly hired NSP Executive

Director, Meegan Moszynski. I am encouraged to hear the National office and board are committed and strongly support the Alumni Program. A major take away was discussion with Chris Pringle, Board Member and IT guru from Harvard University, who is working on improving our software system, to better track and list alumni's as secondary on patrol rosters, in addition to many other software enhancements.

In addition, I addressed our Division Board and specifically Region Directors, that I would like to see each Region, establish a Region Alumni Advisor position if they do not have one, advise me who the advisors are if not already done so, then I can exchange communications with the Region Alumni Advisors, who can administer the alumni program within their respective region. This will allow an open channel of communications to answer questions, handle registration issues, promote and recruit patrollers who may be considering "going inactive" or moving to "alumni status".

Some Regions have an active Alumni Advisor and viable Alumni Program which I look forward for your input and feedback. We have guidelines and promotional material to assist newly established advisors and programs. A Region Alumni Advisor DOES NOT need to be registered as alumni. I recommend that Region Directors solicit or select a patroller who is a self-starter, interested in the program and the desire to get involved at this level for your Region and fellow patrollers. Any RDs or patrollers who may be interested and have questions can feel free contact me.

For Individual patrollers:

If you are an individual patroller considering alumni status, check out the NSP Alumni Manual on the NSP website, and consider Alumni status. It provides you ongoing NSP registration, access to NSP catalog and sweet deals, info from the NSP, your individual patrol and the "halo status" of continuing your NSP affiliation! Talk with your individual patrol's leadership; there is always a place for an alum who seeks to stay active in unique ways to match your talents! For more info, go to NSP website: www.nsp.org, Sign In, click on "For Members", click on "PROGRAMS", select from drop down "Alumni". The NSP Alumni Manual and FAQs should answer most of your questions.

For individual patrols, several suggestions:

- 1. Appoint someone from your patrol as your alumni advisor.
- 2. Send that advisor's contact information to your Region Alumni Advisor, or to me if your Region does not yet have an Advisor.

3. If you already have an active alumni program, please advise your Region Advisor or myself and share your ideas/events that worked like crazy for you. Sharing this info will strengthen our Region and Division Alumni programs.

I am hoping to assist as best I can in the coming ski season in promoting, rewarding and energizing your patrol's Alumni program and our Division's Alumni program.

Renew Alumni dues on-line!

Alumni members, renew your NSP Dues on-line. I have had this question come up several times recently – "can I renew my Alumni Membership on-line"? YES – 3 easy steps:

Here's how to do it; as an Alumni member you merely:

- a) Log into the NSP web site, with member number and your Password, then,
- b) At top, upper right where it will say "Hi, (member name)" merely click on that icon, and it takes you to your My Profile page, then
- c) At bottom left of the Profile, click on the "Renew Now" button, and it allows you to pay with a choice of credit cards, Pay Pal and the like.

Imagine a fellow patroller asking, "what are your plans for this year?", or "what are you working on?" Go on a quick hypothetical journey with me...

Until we write them down and define them, they are only dreams.

Let's say that "Rena" is working toward her Sr. Ski & Toboggan and her Level I PSIA credential. What might her year look like?

March: Rena scribbles down some short and long term goals for the following year. 1). Get her Sr. S & T. 2). Achieve PSIA LI. Long-term goals: become a Sr. Evaluator in her Region, and teach within the Division NSP-C Snowsports School as a L3 Instructor.

September: Rena rides her bike during the summer months and takes 3 mile walks with her dog Ralph on a regular basis. She takes out her journal and re-

evaluates the goals she set in March. Confident, she reviews the NSP Region calendar and the PSIA-C events calendar. She selects her events and puts them into her personal calendar.

October: Rena continues to ride but is losing some joy b/c the winds are picking up and the air is colder. Rena begins to slowly transition into the gym where she focuses on her core and leg strengthening. She also attends the local pro night at her local Ski / Ride Shop and reviews her boot fit and drops off her skis for a tune. She notices Ralph picking up a couple pounds and re commits to those 3 mile walks. Rena refreshers her OEC and CPR, and pitches in at the local refresher. She passes up an opportunity to help out at the Region level for a job posting to focus on her development plan. She maintains her role locally as OEC IT.

November: The NSP-C Snowsports calendar is online and Rena selects a SES and a TES locally, and a SES & TES in her region that she will travel to that has more difficult terrain. Rena seeks out her PD and

asks to be considered to attend the NSP Division ASDW clinics in December. Knowing that she may not be picked, she creates a backup plan to take a PSIA education event to still get on the snow early.

December: Rena attends the PSIA education event. She leaves the event confident but realizes she needs to step up her academic side regarding the Teaching Cycle, developing more flexible progressions, and working on moving COM over the inside foot for wedge turns. She makes an adjustment to her calendar: she will do some shadow work with the local PSIA/AASI snow sports school.

January: Rena is growing in her skills. Her shifts are going fantastic; she is part of a great team and she loves making contributions. She's had two tough night time extractions and she has experienced a growth spurt in her toboggan training. She attends her local TES and SES and she gets local affirmation that she is ready for her NSP Sr. exam. Her sign off paperwork in hand, she travels to the TES/SES that will be her personal test for evaluation against the ski/toboggan Sr. standard. With success and some solid feedback, she preps for February's Sr. exam and her PSIA LI test.

February: On quiet shift nights, Rena is testing her friendships as she grabs friends and turns them into pretend students, practicing her new exercise lines for her LI test. She is contacted by the Region OEC Administrator about helping out at this year's Sr. OEC test as a patient; she accepts. Rena continues to eat

a healthy diet, exercises and makes final prep for her upcoming exam. The Sr. exam is at a tough mountain but she has prepared and has skied there before. Her PSIA exam is local and she is ready.

March: It was a schedule-packed season, but Rena was successful in reaching her goals. She invested greatly in herself knowing that her skill development would aid and benefit injured guests, her shift team, and the representation of the NSP cross. It has been good year, and she reflects with satisfaction.

As she sits by the fire with Ralph at her feet, she reviews her feedback from the Sr. Test and PSIA exam. Maybe it's time now to set next year's goals, she thinks. She contacts some friends and makes plans to travel out west in November for an early season primer. Yep, it was a good year.

Unrealistic? Many patrollers have made this journey and you can too. Get together with some likeminded, goal oriented friends and make a study group. Get things going and make plans now for your development.

Until you write them down they are only dreams.

Young Adult Program: Flexibility in programming

How do you encourage young adults to become members of NSP? We've all heard the talk that patrol is aging and younger patrollers are necessary to continue our legacy. How do you compete with all of the activities that millennials are involved in? Do we really think that ski patrol will win over a Driver's Ed class? With competition to get into the best colleges high, students are taking more difficult courses, AP courses, dual-enrollment. What about dating, jobs, and Friday night football games?

Our attempt in spring of 2017 was to be flexible and revamp the OEC program at Mt. Brighton Ski Patrol in an effort to accommodate young adults. Changing our course that normally ran from late July to early November, we switched the time frame of our course to the beginning of May to the end of August. This change was critical to avoiding conflict with school activities.

The second change we made was to switch to the NSP's hybrid course. This was our first experience with this format, but for many students, online coursework was not intimidating. We met Tuesday evenings only, for 3 hours. There were no lectures. A brief review of quiz and test question errors that appeared to be a commonality amongst all of the students began the night. After that, all students moved in groups of 3-4 through a series of skills stations.

Fifteen weeks later, the results were in: 9 young adults participated in the OEC course, 9 of them passed. The students involved in this class received some of the best grades in the class. In short, it was a huge success.



This was a big collaboration between patrols and patrollers. We had a total of 17 students young and old in the class. A sign up genius was provided to enlist the help of patrollers from each patrol involved. Not only did we get the assistance of the people that had signed up online to help, but many parents who had driven their students to class had time to kill, and what better way to use that time than to help out in the classroom. Free help. Many versions of how to do the same skill: all good and all within the scope of the 5th Edition. There was never any animosity, but a mutual respect for a sharing of ideas.

The question then is, is flexibility the key to success in tapping into young adult participation in OEC? If so, since there are clusters of fairly urban patrols throughout the division, what if one patrol in each urban area were to provide a summer hybrid style course and reach out to nearby patrols in an attempt to maximize the involvement of young adults? There are multiple patrols outside of the Minneapolis, Madison/Milwaukee,

Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, and Columbus areas. If each patrol were to encourage just one student to join a summer OEC course in areas where 4-5 ski hills exist, think of how fast we could develop our Young Adult Program in the Central Division. Our experience involved students whose parents patrol 4 hours away, but live down state in the metro Detroit area suburbs. We need to utilize collaboration between patrols if we are truly committed to growing the numbers of young patrol members. Remember, we are not just a bunch of separate patrols, but we are NSP.

Avalanche Program for 2017 through 2018

The NSP avalanche program is going through a full remodeling. The effort is to realign avalanche training to produce a continuum of education while respecting avalanche for recreationist and professionals. The NSP is primarily a recreationist program but will produce pathways to professional education. Professional education is for avalanche forecasters, mountain road crews, professional ski patrollers that mitigate avalanche hazards and search and rescue crews to name a few. The difference is that the professional gets the recreationists basic training but then takes other courses that give them the mentoring to do specialized tasks. The National Avalanche Committee, of which I am a member, met at Snowmass last Spring to discuss the remodel in concurrence with the desires of the American Avalanche Association (AAA). The remodel will not be complete this season so the current Avalanche Instructor Manual will still apply.

So what! Well the avalanche instructor group will be travelling all over the Central Division providing basic avalanche education. Our primary course will be the Level 1, Module 1 classroom session. It's an 8-hr. course that primes everyone for more continuing education. The National Avalanche Committee has determined that the

Central and Southern divisions to not have adequate terrain to educate travel techniques in avalanche terrain. That is essentially Level 1, Module 2 which is (Safety and Travel in avalanche terrain). I disagree with that decision but I am only one vote. There is a way around this. The NSP gives reciprocity to another program called the American Avalanche Institute for Research and Education (AAIRE). AAIRE gives several avalanche Level 1 courses at Mt. Bohemia in January and February. I can give you NSP credit for that so that you may attend a Level 2 course. Below are the ways to gain full recreationist training.

NSP taught Level 1, Module 1-----Take a Level 1 AAIRE course at Mt. Bohemia-----Take a NSP Level 2 course out West or East.

NSP Level 1, Module 1-----NSP Level 1, Module 2 out West or East-----Take a NSP Level 2 course out West or East.



Some extra pointers to help you:

- Download and use the most current Instructor paperwork and keep it in e-form to avoid losing your paperwork.

- Contact your Region OEC Administrator for assignment of an OEC IT from an outside patrol to do the final observation when your Instructor Candidate is ready to be observed.

There are many ways to improve your OEC skills and confidence: on those slower moments of your shift- pull out the equipment and practice it with an instructor on your team, join a group that is training for Senior Status, volunteer to help at the OEC-MSP (OEC Module of the Senior Program). There are countless opportunities and our injured guests depend on YOU!

Telecommunications

Greetings fellow patrollers. Think snow.

So, the rush to rebanding is over. What's next for ski patrol telecommunications? Digital Mobile Radio (DMR) is the next new thing. Do you have to switch to DMR? No. It is an open source non proprietary technology that makes better use of the RF spectrum. In addition, just like your smartphone, you can send short text messages and other digital information including your location.

The FCC has made the industry aware that the next level of narrowbanding is coming. What they have not done yet is set a date for this to happen. They are going to move to a 6.25 kHZ bandwidth or effective use of 6.25 kHZ spectrum. The DMR channels split the 12.5 kHZ bandwidth into two talk paths. This makes DMR an acceptable solution to the coming mandate. Having the option for the two talk paths also means that you can create two separate groups of users. Be forewarned, it is coming.

The current design of analog radio will not be capable of meeting the coming standard. Some type of digital architecture will need to be deployed. Many of the current DMR radios are able to operate in analog mode until the time comes to make the digital jump. Some simple programming is all that it takes to make the change.

Repeaters are available in VHF and UHF that also allow analog use and then some simple programming makes the change to digital.

The cost of DMR equipment has rapidly been decreasing to the point that some vendors are cheaper and just as high quality of the radio equipment you may already be using. Accessory items are more affordable as well. I have been using radios from several manufacturers for more than two years now. I use them year-round. I spent no more that \$200.00 for any of these radios

What are some of the main advantages of switching to digital? High on that list is improved voice clarity. With DMR you have almost no static in your radio transmissions. The signal is processed in a digital manner and able to filter out unwanted noise. Also you are either in range or out of range. There is very little grey area. Another area of improvement is battery life, the radio only transmits for half the time of an analog radio. 8 to 10 hours of true use are possible with digital radio. Using applications built into the radio it is also possible to send text messages to a specific radio or a group of radios. You are also able to call a specific radio. The radios can also be configured to alert others if the radio is left in an unusual position such as a fall. For radios that have GPS receivers built into them, mapping programs can tell you where all the other radios in your system are. Other applications will be developed as users request them.

What is DMR. There are several types of digital transmission. Some are very expensive (P25), others are designed for certain applications (TETRA, Nexedge), and some are designed for specific types of users. Dstar) As an open source product, it is available to all at a low price and developers are able to customize the product to have even more functionality.

Are DMR radios in your future? Think about it. It will pay off in the end. Don't wait for the FCC to set a date for the 6.25 kHZ mandate, get ahead of it.

NOTICE OF 2018 CENTRAL DIVISION ELECTIONS



Ken Meldahl CD Elections Coordinator Following the Policies & Procedures of the Central Division, Region Directors for North Central, Northern Michigan and Southern will be elected in 2018. One nomination form can be used for each elections. The nomination form located in this RPN may be used and sent to me by January 26, 2018 or the easiest method is to go to the Central Division website, find elections and fill out the form and submit, also by January 26, 2018. In addition, Section Chief Elections for Sections 1 and 4 should also take place this season. Section Chief Elections are run by each Region with the results reported to the Division Election Coordinator. All election processes and procedures can be found in the current Central Division Policies and Procedures which can be found on the Central Division website.

REGION DIRECTOR ELECTIONS:

- NORTH CENTRAL REGION
- NORTHERN MICHIGAN REGION
- SOUTHERN REGION

In accordance with the current Policies & Procedures of the Central Division, an election for the position of Region Director for NORTH CENTRAL, NORTHERN MICHIGAN AND SOUTHERN REGIONS will be held in the year 2018. The Region Director serves a three-year term, administers the Region according to the Region's Bylaws and Policies and Procedures and reports directly to the Central Division Director.

Qualifications:

- 1. Must be a registered NSP member for at least five years
- 2. Must have served as a Section Chief, Patrol Representative, or National, Division or Region Program Supervisor/Administrator for at least two years.
- 3. Must be familiar with National policies and procedures as defined in the current NSP Policies and Procedures manual.
- 4. Must be familiar with the Region's policies and procedures, as applicable.
- 5. Must be registered in the Division as a Senior (Alpine, Nordic or Auxiliary) Patroller or Certified Patroller.

Responsibilities:

- 1. Supports and fosters NSP mission Statement.
- 2. Promotes and supports all NSP education programs within the Region to maintain the integrity of NSP training standards.
- 3. As a member of the Division Board of Directors, the Region Director is responsible for duties developed and designated by the Division Board of Directors.
- 4. Responsible for all aspects of the NSP programs and activities supported by the Region.
- 5. Promotes the financial support of the NSP and its programs.
- 6. Visits all areas with the Region during their term of office.
- 7. Submits an annual report to the Division Board of Directors.
- 8. Is responsible for communicating National and Division policies to Sections and NSP Registration Units, and is responsible for communicating NSP Registration Unit concerns to the Division Director and/or Division Program Supervisors.
- 9. Writes articles and reports for Division Newsletter.
- 10. Ensures that all Section and NSP Registration Units submit annual reports and financial reports in a timely manner.
- 11. Recommends individuals to the Division Program Supervisors, and in consensus with them, appoints individuals to serve as Region Program Administrators.
- 12. Monitors the performance and effectiveness of Region Program Administrators and recommends changes in concert with the Division Program Supervisor when appropriate.

NOMINATION PROCEDURE:

Nomination may be made by any Region active patroller in good standing or by self nomination. The nomination form can be found in this issue of the RPN or can be downloaded from the Central Division website: www.nspcentral.org. Nomination forms must be received by the Division Election Coordinator by January 26, 2018. Nominees will be sent a "Candidate Information Sheet" that must be returned by February 9, 2018. All nominees must follow "Guidelines of Conduct for Candidates" found in the current Central Division Policies & Procedures.

ELECTION PROCEDURE:

The Division Election Coordinator will verify qualifications of nominees, notify nominees of any deficiencies and collect nominee's resumes and/or position statements which will be distributed to the electorate along with voting instructions by February 15, 2018. Ballots must be returned by March 8, 2018. Tabulation of ballots by the Division Election Coordinator and validated by the Election Review Committee by March 19, 2018. Election results will be announced to the electorate and posted on the Division website by March 27, 2018.

ELECTORATE:

The votes for the election of the Region Director shall consist of the following:

One vote for each Section Chief and Patrol Representative; one additional elector for patrols with 51 to 100 members, two additional electors for patrols with 101 to 150 members, and three additional electors for patrols with over 150 members. The number of members is based on the June 30th membership of the previous year.

Each elector must be an active member of that patrol with two or more years of service in the Division. The names, addresses and email of these electors shall be made available to the Division Election Coordinator no later than January 15, 2018. Compliance shall be the responsibility of the Region Election Coordinator, or the Region Director if no Region Election Coordinator is appointed.

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One vote for every registered member of the Region. If the one patroller one vote option is selected, the entire cost and operation of the election will be borne by the Region. The process and timing for the election must be pre-approved in writing by the Central Division Election Coordinator. The process will be monitored and certified by the Division Election Coordinator.

Whichever population is used, the election outcome will be determined by a simple majority of the votes cast. If a tie occurs, it will be broken by the Division Director.

The bike patrol advisor is a new role and over the next few months, I plan to clarify the role and start reaching out to areas in the division that have bike patrols or plan to start bike patrols. I will also be developing content on the central division website. In the

meantime, I would love to hear your questions about bike patrolling. Those questions will help me define the role and better help the division.

The Story of Pando and the Pando Patrol

Pando Patrol will send Western Michigan Region its final report after June 30th of this year. We thought it was appropriate to record some of the story of Pando and the Pando Patrol. You really can't talk about the Pando Ski Patrol without talking about Pando the business. They go hand in hand because they function like family. Hopefully, you will see that family interwoven throughout this story.

I would like to mention how Pando got started. Dick, Tom and Don Bresnahan owned Bresnahan Septic. It was seasonal work. The Bresnahan brothers wanted their employees to work year round. Dick drove by the future site of Pando every day. It was the last place you could find snow on the ground as winter moved into spring. It was that image that gave Dick an idea. After consulting with his brothers, They decided to develop a ski area at that location. The land was leased from Jim Sutkatis. Dick Bresnahan's experience in WWII would determine the ski areas name. He belonged to the 10th Army Division stationed in Colorado. The division was divided into several camps. His camp was named Hale. The train station at Hale was named Pando. One of the ski runs at Pando bears the name Hale.

Under the leadership of the Bresnahan brothers, Pando opened for skiing in the 1963/64 ski season. The Pando Patrol also started that same season under the leadership of its first Patrol Director, Rob Morley. There were 12 PDs that served Pando. They are: 1 Rob Morley, 2 an unnamed woman who filled out Rob's last year, 3 Claude Katt, 4 Clint Lindhout, 5 Tom Trimpe, 6 David McAfee, 7 Tony Wolfer, 8 Jim M Fadden, 9 David Menke, 10 Patrick Markey, 11 Colleen Wolfer and 12 Randy Slater. I'm very proud to be in their company.

The Pando Patrol was very active in their early years planning, organizing and running skiing events for kids. The events brought out parents who started skiing for their first time. Pando was the only ski area in Kent County at that point.

The Pando Patrol patrolled the first competitive snowboarding in the country. The boards in the first competition had a rope attached and kept the patrollers very busy. The next year Jake Burton Carpenter brought a modified snurf board with bindings to Pando. A new event was created.

The patrol worked very well with the Pando ski school. There were lessons taught every night of the week. People who bought skis at Bill and Paul's were sent to Pando for instruction. Pando had a booming

business in the mid 60s. None of the early success happened without good communications between the patrol, ski school, management and owners. Richard Outman, who recruited me into the Pando Ski Patrol, was a member of its first ski school in 1964. He said there was always an open door for communication with the owners. Richard is an active member of our patrol today. He is the only patroller to help open Pando in 1964 and help close it in 2015.

The Pando Ski Patrol was asked to help Bill and Paul's with their ski swap. The swap was well received by the public and quickly moved to larger locations: Grand Rapids Ski Club, Eastbrook Mall and its present location, Cannonsburg. The Pando ski patrol has played an integral part in the success of the swap each year. Claude Katt and Tom Trimpe anchored the swap for many years. Tony and Colleen Wolfer combine for 100s of hours each year.

The Bresnahans sold their business in 1978 to Jack Kronemeyer, Dan Smith and Ray Castine. The Pando family continued to function very well. The patrollers worked behind the counter, cleaned the lodge and helped with maintenance. Under the new owners, the patrollers improved the conditions of their patr room. I've heard stories of injured skiers being brought into the old patrol room through a window because the building was so crowded with skiers.

The Pando patrol earned some awards along the way: In the 2006-7 ski season, the patrol received the runner up award for Division Outstanding Small Patrol.

At the Division meeting in 2010 in Minnesota, the Pando Patrol was awarded first place in the Division for Oustanding Small Patrol. They also received the National Ski Patrol runner up award and a Unit Citation. At that meeting, it was the first time that the owners of a resort attended a Division meeting in support of their patrol. A year later, Brett Cutler, our awards writer composed a letter of appreciation of our owners and submitted it to Western Michigan Region. Pando's owners received a Distinguished Service Award.

The area's support of its patrol continued. I was one of the patrollers that helped plan the 2015 Division Meeting held in the Western Michigan Region. At one of the meetings it was suggested that we go back to our resort owners and ask for \$500 to help support the Division Meeting. Pando, being less than half the size of the other resorts could donate \$250. A few days later, in the quiet confines of Jack Kronemeyer's home, I explained to Jack what the planning committee wanted resort owners to donate. Jack thought for less than one minute and said, "we'll donate \$500."

Many Pando patrollers are CPR instructors who support the fall CPR refresher as part of the Section refresher. They also teach the new class of candidates. More than half of the patrollers are OEC instructors.

The patrol has 3 to 4 meetings during the year. For the past 20 years, one of those meetings each year takes place out of area. Last March, the meeting was at Whistler Blackcomb in British Columbia.

The patrol gives out 4 awards at the end of each year: Patroller of the Year, CJ Lindhout, Bravo and the Crash Helmet Award. Names are submitted for each award and the patrollers vote for the person who will have their name engraved on the award.

And now a few parting comments:

Richard Outman tried recruiting me for the patrol after watching me try to ski on a field trip with 150 5th graders. I told him, "I don't know how to ski." He said, "that's okay, we will teach you." They didn't realize how much time that would take. There were no skiers in my family. Needless to say, I was extremely timid from the top of any hill with a pair of skis on my feet. The Pando Patrol kept their promise with Dave Corey helping. I am now an Alpine Patroller, CPR instructor, OEC instructor and a very proud member of the Pando Ski Patrol.
