Patrolling has been a part of my life since I was 15 years old and for the past 35 years I have held many local, region and division roles including Assistant Patrol Director, Region Senior Program Admin, OEC IT, ORT IT, Instructor Development-IT,

Instructor Development: I've been an Elementary School teacher for the past 19 years and hold a Master's degree in Classroom Instruction. The ID program is the first step for all future instructors. We need to encourage everyone to take the ID course and get involved with one aspect of instructing. "Many hands make light work" and people who teach are the most invested in a program's success. If everyone has something that they "own" as an instructor, we will enjoy it more. The online ID program is an easy way to begin your instructing journey... GO FOR IT!

Young Adult Program: I became a patroller when I was 16 yrs. old. This is my 35th year as a patroller. Young patrollers are the future of our organization. Many young people are looking to break into the adult world. For me that meant becoming a patroller! Who can you inspire? Who can you mentor to become an instructor or guide from the side? We touch the future when we work with Young Adults and we help them stay with our program when we build strong relationships with them. My closest friends are my ski patrol mentors from my earliest days of patrolling. What young adult can you connect with and inspire? If you are a Young Adult, what can you bring to the patrol that is needed? Energy? A new perspective? Technology skills? You have a lot to offer and I can tell you that Ski Patrol people can change the trajectory of your adult life and create opportunities and networks to enrich your future!!

Senior Program: I have coordinated all aspects of the Senior training and evaluation program in South Central Region for the past 5 years. I have been an evaluator in OEC and Toboggan modules on and off throughout my patrol career at the Basic, Senior and Certified program levels. The vision of the Senior program is to continue to develop our Basic patrollers skills through positive learning opportunities and the mindset of "Continual Improvement". Confidence in handling emergency situations doesn't just happen, neither do Skiing/Boarding and tobogganing skills. They can be learned with instruction and feedback from quality instructors. We all win when we actively practice and are willing to "fail forward" as we learn. Our goal is to create a positive learning opportunity for patrollers to grow their skills to achieve success as patrollers, not just to "clear the bar" of senior.

SnowSports School and PSIA: I completed my Level 1 PSIA this past season and I instruct at Little Switzerland. To make us all stronger, we need quality ski and snowboard instruction. We have many opportunities to develop our instructing skills. We will be adding more options this year! Alpine Skills Development Workshops, Women's Clinics, and mentoring relationships are all paths to strengthening our teaching skills. PSIA is an incredible resource of knowledge to tap into. This is a great direction to pursue for all patrollers who what to help make us all grow.

Women's Program: I was the first Central Division Women's Program Advisor and held the position for 5 years. I instruct each year at the Region Women's Clinic and every other year at the Division clinics. Developing female leaders, instructors, and patrollers is our mission. This is done by holding quality programs where ladies can network, practice with instruction and encourage each other. So many women are the "only" female instructor on their patrol. We need to increase the skills and presence of female leaders in our patrols, therefore we will be holding TWO Division level Women's clinics this season. We want more women to join us.

Safety: Safety is what we do!! I have always believed that we need to educate our snow sports public on how to best enjoy our sport in a safe manner. I love educational promotions that help people be safe as they enjoy the sport. This is a critical program and should be a focus of our interaction with the skiing public. What is your local safety program? What could it be? Think outside the box or follow the program ideas from National. Purchase and distribute the Safety SWAG that is offered.

I ask ALL patrollers to take a look at your local and Region programs and reach out to offer to help with some aspect of a program that intrigues you. What do you want to learn more about? What program could you become an instructor for? How can you improve your own skill set and offer to help others grow their own skills? What is a YAP?

A Young Adult Patroller is a basic ski patroller, a member of NSP that has successfully completed, or is on their way to completing both their skiing and tobogganing requirements and their OEC certification. They have met all of the qualifications that other ski patrol members have met. The difference? They are between the ages of 15-18. As a young adult, they will need mentoring, guidance, and the support of seasoned ski patrol members, as all new patrollers will. So why have this classification at all?

When students are registered at NSP as YAPs, YAP supervisors and others interested in hosting a YAP specific event can more easily identify where these students are, how many we have, and how to better plan for their event. As much as YAPs learn from us, they also enjoy the camaraderie of others their own age. The Eastern and Rocky Mountain Divisions annually host large, successful YAP events with ski and toboggan skill enhancement and OEC challenges and competitions that encourage these students to raise their skill levels and seek further

training within NSP while having fun with their friends. We have yet to grow our programs to this level within the Central Division. It is time to recruit and grow this program.

If you know of a student that enjoys skiing or boarding, and wants to make a difference in the world by providing care for injured ski resort guests, NSP is a perfect match. The experiences students obtain through patrolling teach lessons and grow friendships that will last a lifetime. The Young Adult Program was initiated to encourage younger qualified students to become members of the NSP and bring a younger generation to our organization. Their membership presence brings with it new ideas and views to our organization. Your patrol will be better for embracing the YAP program.

426 Fund

Otherwise known as the Dan Somalski Memorial Fund, this trust was set up to honor a very special friend, patroller and mentor, the late Dan Somalski. Dan, as many of us know, dedicated much of his 25 year patrol career to helping others attain their goals both on and off of the mountain. As a long time Certified (#426) and PSIA level 3 he was legendary both inside and outside of the handles. It is in memory of Dan's example that the trust was created to ease the burden of a patroller's credentialing costs, while encouraging advancement.



The fund committee is currently seeking applications from interested patrollers that could use financial assistance in their quest for further credentialing advancement.

Senior Program





The Mission of the Central Division senior program, as captured in the Central Division Senior Program Manual, is as follows.

The Senior program is governed by the National Ski Patrol,

administered by the Central Division, and implemented by the regions. The mission of the Central Division is to provide guidance to the regions in the administration of the NSP Senior program. The primary goal of the Central Division Senior Manual is to provide a resource to be used to maintain the integrity and consistency of the Senior programs across all regions in the division. The division encourages crossboundary exchanges between the regions, the sharing of ideas and resources, and striving for continuous Senior program improvement.

This article summarizes the program activities of the on-hill portion of the Central Division senior program over the past three years.

Central Division Senior Program Manual – The Central Division Board of Directors is responsible for the Senior Program Manual. The Board of Directors is primarily made up of the Region Directors. Over the past three years changes have been made to the Senior Program Manual with the goals of improving the consistency of the senior on-hill training and evaluations between regions, from season to season, and between disciplines (alpine ski, tele ski, and ride). The following primary enhancements were made to the senior program and captured in the Senior Program Manual to support these goals.

- Added a checklist for candidates to follow on their senior journey.
- Generated a combined alpine ski/telemark/ride scorecard aligned with the technical fundamentals developed by the Professional Ski Instructors of America (PSIA).
- Revised certification and calibration requirements for evaluators for senior ski/ride and senior toboggan disciplines.
- Revised the Quality Assurance guidelines and practices to balance division administration with region implementation.

Senior On-Hill Evaluation and Evaluator Statistics – Following are some statistics from the senior on-hill program for the past three years.

- Senior on-hill (ski/ride and/or toboggan) evaluation participants 182
- Participants who passed senior on-hill evaluations 149
- Senior Ski/Ride Evaluators calibrated 106
- Senior Toboggan Evaluators calibrated 130

As you can see, the senior on-hill program, as implemented by the regions and administered by the division, has had a very active and successful three years. Thanks to the multitude of people who contributed to this success.

At this point, it is time to introduce the new Central Division Senior Program Supervisor. Jeff Jurcak will be taking the ball and running with this role effective July 1st. Jeff brings a wealth of experience in ski and toboggan training, evaluation, and administration at the division, region, and patrol levels. Jeff and I have been working together to make the transition as smooth and seamless as possible. I am very confident Jeff will do an outstanding job with the senior program.

NSP Liaison to Midwest Ski Area Association

I hope everyone has had or is having a great summer. Many of you know me as I have served as Perfect North Slopes Patrol Rep., Ohio Region Director, Central Division Director, served on the National Board of Directors and also as National Chairman. I've been a patroller going on 43 years. As a part of our Division Staff I'm serving as the Liaison between the NSP and the Midwest Ski Area Association, MSAA. I'm sure a few of you may be thinking what the heck does that mean? What I believe it means is that my role will be to serve as a key link between what the NSP (National, Division, Region, and sometimes Patrol) activities are and what MSAA expects and wants from our organizations.

MSAA is made up of Area Owners/Managers of the 110 plus ski areas in the Midwest. They meet for annual meetings in August of each year and switch sides of the Lake Michigan annually. Not every ski area in the Midwest belongs to MSAA, however most do. Many also belong to the National Ski Area Association, NSAA as well. It is close to what we do in NSP. We pay region, division, and national dues, similar to what ski areas do to belong to MSAA and NSAA.

EAS ASSOCIATION

At the annual face to face meetings, they have many subjects taught or discussed in sessions over a 3 to 4 day period, similar to what we do in Region or Division meetings. NSAA staffers do a Fall Education Seminar at this meeting that they run in nearly all Regional/State Ski Area Associations across the nation. A very busy time for them. We, the NSP, and many of us individually have also taught or lead discussions on various subjects they want from us. Examples are: Critical Care Response and Communication, Regulatory Standards like OSHA, ANSI, and the like, NSP's direction from National or Division specific, Round Table Issues effecting Ski Areas and Patrols, Chair Evacuation Training for Owners/GM's, etc.. The Division typically has representatives in attendance and are supported by MSAA. A patrols leadership is welcome to attend but must go through your ski areas Owner/GM for approval. There are costs associated with attendance and your area will be responsible for these and concurrence on your being there. We would hope you understand this is the ski areas meetings, not the NSP.

So, why do this you may be thinking? Like any good partnership the relationship you build and the trust from one another creates the avenue to get things done. Meeting side by side with Area Owners/GM's and the NSP Leadership builds on these attributes and helps clarify the direction we are both going. Last year we conducted two major all day sessions for Owners/GM's concerning Chair Evacuation Training and Equipment needs. This alone resulted in many areas investing in upgrades to the equipment they have had and clarified many misunderstandings of what was required when we as patrols perform this task. A few years ago there was an outcry from areas for a more condensed OEC Manual. As OEC 6 is moving along, one of the goals is to create procedures for us to use. This relationship will only get better as we invest in our understanding of expectation and what we need from each other.

I would hope this quick synopsis of what we do with MSAA/NSAA has been helpful. If you have any questions feel free to drop me a line.

Training With National Ski Patrol Instructors

Through the completion of one month of Outdoor Emergency Care (OEC) training, hosted by the Alpine Valley Ski Patrol, I gained an increased understanding of the training, scope of practice, and organizational structure of slope-side first responders. In addition to this, I learned many valuable skills that will be useful during my career in medicine, as well as during my time in the outdoors. These combined lessons during the month of March will foster better relationships with first responders in my practice, as well as improve communication and understanding between first responders and hospital care providers.

As someone who recently experienced a traumatic injury that was cared for by National Ski Patrol trained patrollers, I was very interested to see how protocols and skills training are developed and performed. Through my experience this month, I realized that volunteers from the community enroll in the outdoor emergency care course often times without prior medical training. It is through their hard work and persistence that they are able to gain the knowledge and skills required to be an effective first responder. It is through the efforts of volunteers like this that has earned the National Ski Patrol a reputation for being an excellent first responder corps. This reputation is the earned result of hard work and selfless dedication to helping others, and I appreciate their work a great deal. Trained instructors sacrifice their time to educate the incoming class of patrollers, something that was passed down to them years before. Training is hosted by senior patrol members, and in this instance, occurred on Sunday nights. The curriculum was well structured and instructors put additional thought into designing an educational product that is effective and enjoyable. Through observing this instructional experience I now have a fuller understanding of who makes up the National Ski Patrol and the steps they take to get there. This understanding will help me with patient handoffs from first responders, and it will allow me to have a more robust working relationship with all first responders I interact with.

Of added value were the practical skills that I learned during my training. I was familiar with many of the anatomical and medical aspects of the course. However, my medical training thus far has focused on management of injuries once they get to the hospital or operating room. Through OEC instruction, I learned skills like: how to safely remove a ski boot after an injury, how to roll an unconscious patient from prone to supine alone, splinting with a quick splint, and ski binding removal during a lower extremity injury. The above list is not exhaustive in any sense. Simply put, I would go my entire life without the above skills and knowledge if I had not attended this course. To think that I would be void of these skills is wild, considering I spend much of my leisure time on skis and I am going into orthopaedic surgery. This acquisition of skills certainly makes me feel like a better-rounded individual, which is something I hold with great importance.

In summary, I am grateful for the opportunity to learn from training with National Ski Patrol instructors. It has helped to develop my understanding of first responder instruction and will aid me in my future practice. Additionally, I am able to go forth with new skills and practical knowledge that I can pass fourth to my friends, family, and colleagues I ski with. I appreciate those who taught me this month, and those who continue to take time out of their schedule to serve as a National Ski Patroller.

NATIONAL and DIVISION BOARDS GIVE THE SAFETY TEAM PROGRAM A SIGNIFICANT BOOST.

As your new Central Division Safety Team Advisor, I have great news for the Central Division. First, my predecessor, Mike Husar, has been appointed the National Safety Team Advisor. Mike did great presentations to the Division and National Boards who both came through with funding and support for ramping up the Safety Team initiatives.

Why Safety Teams? Because of our Federal Charter, Bylaws and original certificate of incorporation for the NSP.

Kevin McQuillan Safety Team Advisor

From our Federal Charter:

The purposes of the corporation are—

(1) to promote, in every way, patriotic, scientific, educational, and civic improvement activities and public safety in skiing, by such means as the dissemination of information and the formation of volunteer local patrols consisting of competent skiers trained in first aid for the purpose of preventing accidents and redering speedy assistance to individuals sustaining accidents; and

(2) to solicit contributions of money, services, and other property for, and generally to encourage and assist in carrying out these purposes in every way. (Pub. L. 105–225, Aug. 12, 1998, 112 Stat. 1418.)

From the Bylaws:

(The following is a summary of the purpose as set forth by the original incorporators on the Certificate of Incorporation duly filed in the State of New York on August 12, 1948...)

The purposes for which it is to be formed are:

a *In any and all ways to promote public safety in skiing, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the dissemination of information with respect thereto and the formation of local NSP registration units, consisting of competent skiers trained in the administration of first aid, for the purpose of preventing accidents and rendering speedy assistance to persons sustaining accidents; to solicit contributions of money, services and other property for, and generally to encourage and assist in carrying out, the foregoing purposes in every way.*

Now we have the chance to promote public safety in skiing, and to disseminate information with respect to promoting public safety in skiing.

One of the goals are to do such promotion, including at the grade school and high school levels away from and at the areas. Many of the areas, especially smaller areas are not aware of the excellent videos, radio spots and other materials promoting safety available from the NSP and its industry partners. We have the Lead by Example pin program that with further support can have even more of an impact on the skiing/riding public.

The National Board has approved a budget for the National Safety Team to have a face to face meeting in August and I will be attending.

The Division Board has approved a budget for me to hold a face to face meeting of the Division Safety Team which will consist of the Region Safety Team Advisors. This will be held at the Fall Division Meeting in Cleveland to share what the National Team develops and to tailor a program for the unique needs of the Central Division.

I will need all the help I can get from the Regions and the area patrols to help disseminate the program and fulfill the important purpose of promoting public safety in skiing.

We have guidelines and promotional material to assist newly established advisors and programs. A Region Alumni Advisor DOES NOT need to be registered as alumni. I recommend that Region Directors solicit or select a patroller who is a self-starter, interested in the program and the desire to get involved at this level for your Region and fellow patrollers.
