

Happy New Year to all those in the Central Division! It was my pleasure and honor to travel to all three STW's in December and ski with so many of you. Each of the Senior Evaluation Card groups had thirteen to fourteen senior trainers and evaluators in the group! Wow! These patrollers work throughout a season to prepare senior candidates to be successful taking the senior test. AND then take a weekend to provide a fair senior evaluation. Kudos to all of you!

The Division voted and accepted the new senior evaluation card to be used for the 2010 senior alpine test. The new card is a

reinforcement of the balance, edging, rotary and pressure used in every turn no matter the size. The new card does articulate specific skills necessary in good skiing movements. Focus on both feet turning (simultaneous vs sequential), no traverse between turns, keep both feet on the snow and balance throughout the turn. Open parallel turns are passable skills, some skidding is allowed especially during medium and short radius turns. Nothing radical or new there! Some have asked what about dynamic? YES! If you are moving and turning you are being dynamic. So for clarification dynamic balance is balance in motion. A dynamic parallel turn is turn with more carving than

skidding. Forces created in the turn are used to benefit the turn or following turn. (Reference PSIA Technical Manual)

The new card does clarify what a senior skier must demonstrate to pass the alpine section of the test. The new card provides a clarification of BERP which has not changed. The new card does ask for all types of turn sizes and these can be done in one run based on terrain. There is just one more very important clarification... Make sure your own personal skiing is there. Make sure that you can describe a turn, how to make a turn, turn initiation, finishing turns, balance throughout the turn and most of all you can ski these turns. For a candidate the demo says it all! A candidate will ski like you. They will use you as that visual standard. Make each turn count!

There was excellent feedback from each of the STW's. Some have asked for a glossary of terms, others received the senior trainer card that was laminated. This is posted on the website under 'Senior Trainer Card" and can be used as a reference when you are training. Your SES clinics will provide a perfect opportunity to share the new senior evaluation card. Above all, skiing/ boarding is fun! Make that the priority!

MTR Courses Set and Ready for You

Already I see several courses on there way this year in the Division. I want to thank all of those that have participated and help put these courses on.

I have been working with Bill Baer and Melanie Fullman, two MTR instructors from the U.P who are employees of the US Forest Service, officers of Gog. Co. Search & Rescue, and long-time National Ski Patrollers. They each have 25+ years of experience living, working (and searching for folks) in Michigan, Idaho, Washington, and Alaska.

We will be holding an MTR2 / instructor development course in the rolling hills and incised valleys of the Bessemer Ranger District (Ottawa National Forest) on March 12-14-2010. We will be starting around 6:00 p.m on Friday and finishing up by 12:00 p.m on Sunday. In addition to working with other Patrollers, attendees will participate in field rescue exercises with the Gogebic County Search & Rescue unit. The class is designed to accommodate a range of outdoor skills, mixing various levels of previous experience.

Topics will include:

From Here to There: a map & compass refresher that will

cover topo maps, dead eckoning, and GPS

- Pigs in a Blanket (aka Emergency Toboggan Construction)
- That's NOT a KNOT! (knots refresher)
- Hangin' with Friends: a ropes refresher in a controlled environment (an unheated but wind-protected and illuminated barn)
- Proper equipment and clothing

There will be two or three field scenarios which will emphasize group learning. Effective search techniques, patient care, effective rescue, and communications will be the primary focus. There are no tricks; there is no test. Teamwork and communication = successful searches. Several participants will have chances for command positions with possible LAR (low angle rescue) needed to extract victims. A debriefing will be held at the end of each completed scenario to go over plus and minus of operation.

Due to terrain and snow conditions, participants should bring XC skis and/or snowshoes. Those wanting to camp, either in tents or self-made snow caves, should bring appropriate camping gear, clothing, and supplies for below 0° temperatures. Warm indoor shelter will be available. Friday dinner and possibly Sat. dinner will be group meals; participants will need to provide their own field meals and snacks. Anyone wishing to attend please let me know by Feb. 14-2010. Class space will be limited due to the nature of it and there will be a registration fee of 20.00. If you are an instructor and would like to help out please let me know. Mountain Travel and Rescue Action Suit

Mountain Travel and Rescue: the "Action Suit" Philosophy

Layering your clothing is an essential skill for enjoying activities in outdoor winter environments. The versatility of this system has a number of demonstrated benefits: multiple, light-weight garments trap and hold air between each layer, temperature regulation is controlled through addition and removal of layers, and moisture is controlled through wicking and frequent adjustment. The basic components of the layering system are 1) a wicking base layer, 2) breathable insulation layers, and 3) a protective outer shell. The idea is to build an adjustable cocoon of warm air with loose-fitting, easy on-off clothing for micro-adjustment of your immediate environment throughout the day's activities.

Your level of preparation and experience, e.g. your knowledge of equipment, skills, and the expected weather forecast, as well as the number of times you have participated in different field activities during varying weather conditions, will determine the number and type of layers you use. You typically wear more layers at the beginning of your activity, when stopping for rest, water, or food, and when telling lies around the campfire. During periods of high-level activity, removal of layers allows for adjustment of heat and moisture, keeping your cocoon at a safe and comfortable equilibrium and your muscles operating at optimum efficiency.

Mark Twight, a prominent American mountaineer and technical director of Mountain Mobility Group, LLC, has developed a variation of the traditional layering system that considers certain nuances when participating in sustained physical activities such as mountain travel and Nordic skiing: the "action suit" philosophy. The "action suit" philosophy promotes a subtle shift to the traditional layering system: instead of adding and removing insulation layers *under* the protective shell, layer *over the top*.

The well-conditioned, well-fueled human combustion engine operates at a high level of efficiency for many hours each day. The human body will function at a relatively consistent level of energy output during this time. The "action suit" keeps you cool so you don't overheat and you don't over-sweat. Warmth is managed by physical activity and by placing bulky layers over the top of the "action suit" during periods of rest. When patrolling in a typical alpine ski and snowboard environment, you will spend much of your time on a chairlift, on-scene assisting an injured guest, or interacting with the alpine community. Often there are indoor facilities available for rest and warmth, and the traditional layering system is ideal for this type of stop-and-go activity. The "action suit," however, provides consistent temperature and moisture

regulation during extended periods of sustained activity:

Begin with a basic wicking layer and add only those layers that are appropriate for the highest level of sustained physical activity and expected environmental conditions. This is the same combination of clothing you would wear during peak times of exertion under the traditional layering system, however the "action suit" serves as your second skin—a breathable layer of protection tailored to the environment that you do not remove. Moisture control is essential for maintaining a safe and efficient, comfortable cocoon, and each layer of the "action suit"-base, insulation, and shell-must wick and/or breath. When you cease activity for an extended period of time, place a thick, insulating layer, such as a synthetic parka, over the top of your "action suit." When you are ready to get back on the trail, simply remove the parka and you are poised for peak levels of performance, once again.

Additionally, the "action suit" philosophy considers items you carry on your person that factor into the system. For instance, consider your backpack: many outdoor enthusiasts carry a large, internal-frame pack for extended periods in the backcountry. Modern, internal-frame packs are constructed with padding, e.g. insulation, which covers a significant portion of the torso. Many outdoorswo/men will attest to the discomfort of the rapid cooling that accompanies a sweat-soaked back when the pack finally comes off! Pack designers have tried to account for this with airflow technology, however the traditional layering system often counters this solution by filling the airspace with the bulk of many, loose-fitting layers. The "action suit" philosophy considers this problem by incorporating pack insulation and its effect into and upon the cocoon.

The Mountain Travel and Rescue courses explore fundamental and advanced techniques of mountain and Nordic travel, including complete instruction in the principles of building safe, efficient, and comfortable clothing systems. Join us in 2009-2010 as we share the many skills and methods available to enhance your enjoyment of, and safety in, the great outdoors. Awards Available at All Levels

In ski patrol there are many awards

Candidates can receive local, section, and some region level awards. Patrollers can receive local, section, region, division, and national level awards

<u>Local awards</u> can be presented to patrollers and candidates for many different functions within a patrol.

<u>Section awards</u> can be presented to patrollers or candidates in the section for service done at section or local levels.

<u>Region awards</u> can be for special exceptional service done by patrollers or candidates at either local or region levels.

- Some examples of this exceptional service at region level are the Southern Cross
- presented by Southern Region, the Insignia award presented by Eastern Michigan
- Region, and the Tenth Mountain Division Association, North Central Chapter Award
- presented to a Western Region patroller for outstanding contributions to the ski patrol.

<u>Division awards</u> can be for outstanding contributions of patrollers at local, region and division level

<u>National awards</u> are given to patrollers for extraordinary service and leadership in NSP credentialed programs.

There are two basic categories of awards- awards recognizing specific achievements and honorary awards recognizing career leadership and achievement.

AWARDS RECOGNIZING SPECIFIC ACHEIVEMENTS

<u>Certificates of Appreciation</u>: awards presented to patrollers or candidates recognizing specific accomplishments during the past ski season or for longer term service. Certificates of Appreciation can be from local, section, region, division or National levels.

<u>Service Recognition Awards</u>: certificates and pins recognize patrollers who have

served the NSP for 5 years or longer and given in increments of five years.

<u>Division Director's Award</u>: Awarded to patrollers who the Central Division Director deems to have provided exceptional service to the Central Division. <u>Central Division Program Award</u>: awarded yearly to patrollers in the Central Division who have offered the most valuable service to each of the 18 Central Division programs

<u>Central Division Outstanding Instructor</u> <u>Trainer</u>- awarded annually to the most valuable Instructor Trainer in the Central Division

<u>Central Division Outstanding Supervi</u> <u>sor</u>: Awarded annually to the most valuable Central Division program supervisor.

<u>Meritorious Service Award</u>: awarded for exceptional service to a retiring Region

<u>Green Merit Star</u>: awarded to a patroller for heroic arduous and hazardous rescue.

<u>Purple Merit Star</u>: awarded to a patroller for directly saving a life using OEC approved interventions.

<u>Blue Merit Star</u>: awarded to a patroller for (a) outstanding support of a Purple Merit Star or (b) for a heroic attempt to save a life where the patient does not survive for 24 hours.

<u>Patroller's Cross:</u> awarded to a patroller who is seriously injured in the course of ski patrol duty

<u>Central Division Critical Care Award</u>: awarded to a Central Division patroller for assessment and care using OEC training and skills that recognizes and treats a patient with a great potential for life threatening injuries and illness.

HONORARY AWARDS

<u>National Appointment</u>: award for senior alpine, senior Nordic, or certified

patrollers for outstanding long term leadership and involvement in NSP credentialed programs

Leadership Commendation Appointment: award for senior Auxiliary Patrollers for outstanding long term leadership and involvement in NSP credentialed programs

Distinguished Service Award: awarded to senior, basic or certified patrollers who have a minimum of 20 years of service to the NSP and have demonstrated long term leadership to NSP credentialed programs

<u>Central Division Lifetime Achievement</u> <u>Award</u> awarded to a Central Division patroller who has over 30 years of service and has demonstrated high levels of continuous leadership over at least a 15 year period of time.

Ohio

Division Patroller on Olympic Med Team

Jim DeWeerd grew up with a passion for skiing, but never in his wildest dreams did he expect to be a part of the Olympics. He might not be competing, but the retired Ministry Medical Group doctor will be part of the medical team for the

Vancouver Olympic Games in February, his second Olympic experience.

DeWeerd, 63, of Stevens Point, who practiced orthopedic and sports medicine for 24 years with Ministry Medical Group, will provide medical assistance to athletes hurt during practice or competition on Cypress Mountain from Feb. 9 to 28.

He also was a physician at the Olympics in Salt Lake City in 2002.

"It was a little breathtaking (to see the games). It's almost a little overwhelming," he said. "Probably the scariest part is the potential of having to deal with a life-threatening injury on the slopes." When patients walked into Rice Medical Center in Stevens Point, DeWeerd almost always had time to step back and evaluate the situation.

"But the scariest part is watching an athlete fall at a high rate of speed ... landing awkwardly and watching them slide to a stop and not moving," he said. "I've had the situation where I've had to tell the world's best skier that they had a knee injury. It's a big emotional crash."

DeWeerd still volunteers for sports medicine events for Ministry Medical Group and also travels to Utah every year for the FIS World Cup, an alpine and freestyle skiing competition. He is the head physician for the Deer Valley World Cup venue. There are several World Cup events around the world each year, where athletes compete against one another for the championship.

He also is a ski patroller at Granite Peak Ski Area in Wausau two days a week and helps people who are hurt on the slopes.


In 2000, he heard the Salt Lake City Olympic Games was seeking volunteers to do ski patrol, so he offered his services.

But after he detailed his experience including as a physician in the U.S. Navy at the Naval Air Station on Whidbey Island in Washington, in the naval reserves for 18 years, and on ski patrols for 38 years — they quickly told him he would be more qualified to be a physician at the Olympics.

He leaves for Vancouver on Thursday and will stay until March 2. There will be about nine physicians and 30 ski patrollers at his venue on Cypress Mountain.

His son, Peter, 35, who practices family medicine in Salt Lake City, said it's exciting his father found another way to keep practicing medicine after retirement.

"I know he really enjoys spending time with the athletes," he said. "The thing for me that's really amazing is the fact that my father ... has worked hard

enough and long enough that he was able to be accepted as part of the (Olympics). I think it's just a testament to his character and his work ethic that they would offer him that opportunity."

The partner company will provide all the hosting necessary to pass and store the video vault for us.


Our members, will upload images to the site, we will do the analysis and send it back to them.


